Greeting to you all my dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I know just as you all know that the lockdown has made everything so difficult which leaves us with varied challenges in our daily life. Again, let us take consolation from the beginning of the first reading from the prophet Isaiah which say to all faint of hearts, Courage! Do not be afraid. Be strong. The broken people represented the frightened, the blind, the deaf, the crippled and the speechless would be restored to wholeness. The land of the people would be fruitful, spring would turn desert into lush farmland. This passage is describing a time of divine restoration. This is our hope that God our Heavenly Father bring us back again to live our normal life through His grace.

Looking at the gospel we may ask what kinds of shortcomings do people have? How do those shortcomings challenge people to grow in faith? They can be physical, emotional, moral, behavioural, or mental as the case may be. In the time of Jesus, the ancients equate many of these shortcomings to demonic possession. Jesus freed a man from a real shortcoming, a demon, but did more than heal him. He allowed the man to hear and to speak the truth. The gift of speech is our chief means of communicating with other people. People with speech impediments are often subject of fun and amusement to people in some society.

We see the trouble Jesus went to on behalf of this poor man, and the care with which he dealt with him. He took him away from the crowd so that he could deal with him in private and to give him His undivided attention. Happily, most of us are neither deaf nor dumb. So, what relevance then has the miracle for us? We have the gift of hearing and speech. But the question is: how well do we use these precious gifts? Everybody has certain impediments that prevent them from making full use of the gift of hearing and speech. So, we need the Lord's healing touch if we are to use these two precious gifts well, to profess the word with our lips. And we need to put it into practice in our lives. The word of God when heard and acted on is like seed falling on good soil, it makes our lives fruitful.

May God bless and keep you all safe in this difficult time, let us continue to pray for ourselves, the church and the entire world, especially our brother and sisters in Afghanistan that the Lord's protection be upon them.

REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

Jesus opens our eyes to the reality of God's presence in our midst, in the goodness of people and in the tenderness of life, even in its vulnerability. He opens our ears to hear the word of God spoken to us by others, revealed to us through the created world.

There is an eschatological dimension to being open to the word of God, because we are opened to hear something from the future. prophets always speak about this future in the present tense. They see happening already. Isaiah proclaims, 'Here is your God!' and the world is transformed. Jesus says 'Be open.' The good news always opens us to future possibilities, to personal and communal transformation, to a new creation. With the word of God, the future invades our present.

Although the eschatological future is already present to us, it is only unfolding, it has not yet opened completely. We still judge each other by appearances. We still miss the presence of God in the poor and the dispossessed, in those who suffer from disease or war or loneliness. We still shun those of another race, or those who have been shaped by another culture, or those who worship God in a different way. Although the eschatological future is present, we have not yet put aside all of the biases of the past, we have not yet been fully transformed. But God has spoken, God has come to save us. God is trustworthy; God keeps faith forever.

Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, the ears of the deaf unsealed, then the lame shall leap like a deer and the tongues of the dumb sing for joy; for water gushes in the desert, streams in the asteland, the scorched earth becomes a lake, the parched land springs of water.

Now suppose a man comes into your synagogue, beautifully dressed and with a gold ring on, and at the same time a poor man comes in, in shabby clothes, and you take notice of the well-dressed man, and say, 'Come this way to the best seats'; then you tell the poor man, 'Stand over there' or 'You can sit on the floor by my foot-rest.' Can't you see that you have used two different standards in your mind, and turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that?

Listen, my dear brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him.

GOSPEL: Mk 7:31-37

He makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the sea of Galilee, right through the

Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'

REFLECTION FOR YOUNG PEOPLE – by Lisa-Marie Calderone-Stewart

People are amazed that Jesus can cure deafness. They are probably also amazed that Jesus would even be interested in giving any attention to a person who cannot hear. In his culture it was a popular belief that if you were deaf or blind or disabled in any way, it was because of a sin – your own sin or the sin of your parents. Anyone with such a condition was considered a social outcast, but Jesus is modelling a new type of behaviour. He reaches out to anyone and everyone – even the ones most people are afraid to touch or talk to. What makes someone a social outcast in your school? (Please do not name any names, but discuss the traits or criteria that might be used to decide why a person might be given such a status.)

Who decides who the social outcasts are? Is there complete agreement, or do different people have different ideas of who is acceptable and who is not acceptable? Does everyone know their own status? Is everyone aware that they are cast as acceptable or not acceptable? If so, how do they know?

What would Jesus say about the social games that are played out by young people in their schools and in their circles of friends? What advice would Jesus give you? Are you willing to follow it? Why or why not?

Do you have any friends or relatives who are deaf? Do you know any sign language? If you yourself are deaf, what is it like not hearing in a world built for those who can hear?
