From the desk (and the heart) of Fr Daniel omi L. J. C. et M. I.

On Wednesday night I was in solidarity with the people in London who gave up their night's sleep to pay their respects to the late Queen. Mine was only a small sacrifice of waiting until 11.20pm to watch on TV the funeral procession from Buckingham Place to Westminster Hall. I found the service of the reception of the coffin moving and powerfully prayerful. Particularly what moved me was the moment when the Westminster Cross was placed at the head of the coffin. Of course the coffin is adorned with the Royal Standard as well as with Queen's crown, orb and sceptre. These royal items may get the attention of many people but the large cross is the clue to appreciate the life of Elizabeth II. Last year in her last Christmas message she said:

'Simple happenings that formed the starting point of the life of Jesus — a man whose teachings have been handed down from generation to generation, and have been the bedrock of my faith. His birth marked a new beginning. As the carol says, "The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight." We have been hearing about the end of an era, an Elizabethan Era, but as I was meditating on the Queen, laying-in-state I couldn't help thinking that she now delivers her very last message. This time not as a reigning monarch but as a Christian directing the attention of mourners to the cross and saying again: 'This is the bedrock of my faith.'

I would like to ask you for your prayers for the 78 Oblates representing different countries gathered in Nemi, Italy, for the 37<sup>th</sup> General Chapter, which began on September 14 and will continue until October 14. Each Religious Order in the Church convokes such a gathering every few years. It is something like a synod or a plenary council but held on a regular basis. After 12 years of Fr Louis Lougan OMI leading the Missionary Oblates the General Chapter will also elect the new Superior General of the Oblate Congregation.

I also welcome Fr Vincent Obialor OMI who will be joining us for the weekends until Christmas. During the week Fr Vincent, who is from Nigeria, will be in Melbourne attending his English language course. He was ordained in 2009 and has worked in parishes in Nigeria, Tchad and Cameroon. He was once the director of a primary school in Nigeria and Chaplain of a diocesan College in Cameroon. I am sure you will make our new Oblate welcome. We may need to establish some way of deciding which Fr Vincent we mean. Maybe we should use Fr Vincent Senior and Fr Vincent Junior or maybe we could go with Fr Vincent the First and Fr Vincent the Second. Anyway we are truly blessed to have such a problem. I assure you of my prayers.

## A reading from the first letter of St Paul to Timothy 1 Tm 2:1-8

My advice is that, first of all, there should be prayers offered for everyone – petitions, intercessions and thanksgiving – and especially for kings and others in authority, so that we may be able to live religious and reverent lives in peace and quiet. To do this is right, and will please God our saviour: he wants everyone to be saved and reach full knowledge of the truth. For there is only one God, and there is only one mediator between God and mankind, himself a man, Christ Jesus, who sacrificed himself as a ransom for them all. He is the evidence of this, sent at the appointed time, and I have been named a herald and apostle of it and – I am telling the truth and no lie – a teacher of the faith and the truth to the pagans.

In every place, then, I want the men to lift their hands up reverently in prayer, with no anger or argument.

## A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke Lk 16:1-13

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There was a rich man and he had a steward who was denounced to him for being wasteful with his property. He called for the man and said, "What is this I hear about you? Draw me up an account of your stewardship because you are not to be my steward any longer." Then the steward said to himself, "Now that my master is taking the stewardship from me, what am I to do? Dig? I am not strong enough. Go begging? I should be too ashamed. Ah, I know what I will do to make sure that when I am dismissed from office there will be some to welcome me into their homes."

'Then he called his master's debtors one by one. To the first he said, "How much do you owe my master?" "One hundred measures of oil," was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond; sit down straight away and write fifty." To another he said, "And you, sir, how much do you owe?" "One hundred measures of wheat," was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond and write eighty."

'The master praised the dishonest steward for his astuteness. For the children of this world are more astute in dealing with their own kind than are the children of light.

'And so I tell you this: use money, tainted as it is, to win you friends, and thus make sure that when it fails you, they will welcome you into the tents of eternity. The man who can be trusted in little things can be trusted in great; the man who is dishonest in little things will be dishonest in great. If then you cannot be trusted with money, that tainted thing, who will trust you with genuine riches? And if you cannot be trusted with what is not yours, who will give you what is your very own?

'No servant can be the slave of two masters: he will either hate the first and love the second, or treat the first with respect and the second with scorn. You cannot be the slave both of God and of money.'
