From the desk (and the heart) of Fr Daniel omi L. J. C. et M. I.

Dear Parishioners

There are moments in life when we don't find energy to do anything. As I am looking at the screen of the computer at the moment I would rather stare through the window in my office, trying to switch my mind off. I find myself numb and hurting. A few hours earlier I was informed that a colleague of mine and a wonderful friend died. We were doing our doctorates at the same time, under supervision of the Late Professor Fr Austin Cooper OMI. I counted it as a blessing that I could share my research journey with Chris. After completion of our PhDs, we worked together at Catholic Theological College in East Melbourne lecturing in Christian Spirituality. If I was able to be your Parish Priest and a lecturer at Uni, it was because Chris understood parish life, and offered his support so that I could do both ministries: Parish and University.

Earlier today when our children were receiving the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the first time, a group of girls came forward to lead us in Prayer of the Faithful. When I looked at them, I remembered Evie and Agatha, Chris' daughters. The photo of the girls was in Chris' University office where we met, discussed and planned so many things, flashed through my mind. I also remembered Chris' wife, Louise. What this pour soul must be going through right now. Please pray for eternal life for Chris and for strength and consolation for his wife and daughters. As I wrote earlier, we owe him a debt of gratitude for making my work at Uni easier so that I could have time and energy to minister in our Parish. In this dark situation I am grateful for my faith in Christ Jesus. Although my heart is heavy, I turn to the Lord looking for his grace and strength. I don't know how people with no faith can get through situations like this. When the world grows dark Jesus Christ always sends a ray of hope and consolation. On Wednesday I was doing a preparation session with a group of First Reconciliation candidates. I began by talking about Holy Week and Easter. When I asked the children what happened on Good Friday a little boy said: 'Jesus was doing the will of God.' When I heard it, I thought: 'It is so inspiring to hear from a child such deep insight.' The boy could easily say that Jesus died on the cross on Good Friday but the boy went much deeper saying that Jesus was doing the will of God. When I learnt about Chris' death the words of that little boy came back to me with their full force. God knew that I would need such words and to make them even stronger he put them into the mouth of an innocent child. I now keep repeating these words: 'Jesus was doing the will of God' thinking about Good Friday and thinking about Chris' passing. I repeat these words thinking about Chris whom I will not see until the Good Lord calls me to himself. But I also repeat these words thinking about Louise, Evie and Agatha.

On behalf of all our Parish, I offer prayer and congratulations to the boys and girls who received the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the First time. After the service I was talking to the Principal of St Mary's, Lisa Broeren, and we both agreed that it was such a powerful, personal, intimate and prayerful celebration. Thank you to all who contributed to it. I hope to see you next Sunday at our AGM.

I assure you of my prayers for you and your families.
