Father's Day's early origins

In Catholic European countries since the Middle Ages fathers were honoured on March 19th, the Feast of Saint Joseph, which recalls Joseph as the father of Jesus and honours his example of ideal fatherhood. The Church supported celebrations of fatherhood from the 14th century.



These traditions came to America with Spanish and Portuguese immigrants. Father's Day as we know it began in the USA in 1908 following a tragic coal mining accident that killed 361 men. A memorial service remembered them as fathers and husbands and acknowledged the 1,000 children who were left fatherless. At that time, Mother's Day was gaining popularity, and many thought fathers deserved the same acknowledgement.

Sonora Smart Dodd began campaigning for the creation of a day to honour fathers. She was one of six children raised by their single father after her mother died in childbirth. Having been lovingly nurtured by her father, she wanted other men to be equally acknowledged. Her first Father's Day event was held on June 19th, 1910, in Spokane, Washington. Father's Day was surprisingly slow to take off, and it was not popularly observed for many years. Only in 1966 did President Johnson designate the third Sunday in June as Father's Day to honour all fathers.

Father's Day in Australia

In Australia we celebrate Father's Day on the first Sunday of September. Again, official recognition of the day was slow, and most Australians didn't even know about it for several decades. Men, in particular, seemed reluctant to celebrate it.

In 1919 Father's Day church services began in

some areas, although on no confirmed date. Mostly they followed America in using the third Sunday in June. There were no other celebrations for Dads until the 1960s. Ms Janet Heyden, in the 1920's, pushed for Australian dads to be showered with tokens of affection from their wives and children. In 1925, she organised the donation, collection, and delivery of small gifts to elderly men who were alone in hospitals or retirement homes. This began our tradition of giving gifts on Father's Day, and interestingly, many of these traditional presents are still given as Father's Day gifts today.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to Philemon

Philemon: 9-10, 12-17

This is Paul writing, an old man now and, what is more, still a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for a child of mine, whose father I became while wearing these chains: I mean Onesimus. I am sending him back to you, and with him — I could say — a part of my own self.

I should have liked to keep him with me; he could have been a substitute for you, to help me while I am in the chains that the Good News has brought me. However, I did not want to do anything without your consent; it would have been forcing your act of kindness, which should be spontaneous. I know you have been deprived of Onesimus for a time, but it was only so that you could have him back for ever, not as a slave any more, but something much better than a slave, a dear brother; especially dear to me, but how much more to you, as a blood-brother as well as a brother in the Lord. So if all that we have in common means anything to you, welcome him as you would me.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke Luke 14:25-33

Great crowds accompanied Jesus on his way and he turned and spoke to them. 'If any man comes to me without hating his father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, yes and his own life too, he cannot be my disciple. Anyone who does not carry his cross and come after me cannot be my disciple.

'And indeed, which of you here, intending to build a tower, would not first sit down and work out the cost to see if he had enough to complete it? Otherwise, if he laid the foundation and then found himself unable to finish the work, the onlookers would all start making fun of him and saying, "Here is a man who started to build and was unable to finish." Or again, what king marching to war against another king would not first sit down and consider whether with ten thousand men he could stand up to the other who advanced against him with twenty thousand? If not, then while the other king was still a long way off, he would send envoys to sue for peace. So in the same way, none of you can be my disciple unless he gives up all his possessions.'
